RABBI JEFFREY M. SIEGEL

Rabbi Siegel, originally from Brooklyn, New York, is twenty-four years of age, and received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Brooklyn College with a major in Hebrew Language and Literature. He then was granted a Masters Degree in Jewish History from Bernard Revel Graduate School of Yeshiva University. Subsequent to that time, he received his ordination from Yeshiva Hadar Ha Torah of Lubavitch in New York. Since then, Rabbi Siegel served as the Assistant Director of the Hillel Foundation at Ohio State University.

Rabbi Siegel will be assisting Rev. Rabenstein in conducting services and will also teach in the New Hope Hebrew School. It is anticipated that Rabbi Siegel will help organize and lead activities in the Shul which will emphasize Judaism in the modern world as well as lead the youth group of the Tri-Synagogue Council.

 RABBI JEFFREY M. SIEGEL**

Upon approaching the Days of Awe, the days of Judgment, Repentance, and Forgiveness, our thoughts are very much devoted to things Jewish. The solemnity of the S'lichos services, the majesty of the Shofar blowing, the intensity of the Yom Kippur prayers will soon be the essence of existence for every loyal son and daughter of Israel. For most of us, however, things seem to return pretty much to normal after the holiday season. The business, the car, the vacation trip take control of our lives. The word T'shuvah — Repentance, really means "return." We return to G-d, making Him the center of our lives. We are to be liberated from the everyday things that enslave us.

The High Holiday season should not be a yearly chore, but rather a new beginning. The blast of the Shofar should awaken us from our spiritual slumber. It is a time to take stock of our past, and to accordingly shape our future lives based on the insights gained. May the blast of the Shofar signal a year of Return, with the inevitable result of a year of Redemption for all Israel, and a year of Peace for all Mankind.

"What we need from you is not just your children, but your heart, soul, and might. You waste your time sending your youngsters to us to learn about Shabbat - unless Shabbat lives in your home. You dissipate your efforts giving your children to us to identify with Jews in Israel and other lands - unless you identify with them by word and deed. It is useless to dispatch a youngster to learn how the Jews pray and studies - unless you join in prayer and study. What we must establish is a partnership. We shall try to do our part, but you must do yours . . .

The other ingredient we need from you is the realization that Judaism is not merely a private commitment you feel in your heart. It is also a public, corporate commitment in which we are a part of a People.

The Synagogue is the instrument of the Jewish people. This Synagogue is the larger Jewish family of this community . . .

This is not merely a building to be used for receptions. This is not simply a school through which a child passes on the way to Bar Mitzvah.

This is not an arbitrary collection of persons which you reject when you disagree with the Synagogue actions.

This is not a financial commitment which you abandon because the cost of automobiles, country clubs and college education is rising.

This is not the least important commitment of the Jew - it is the most important.

When the going gets rough, you cannot walk out on your family. And so, if you ever become perturbed with us, remember; we are one family. The Synagogue is our home, yours and mine. We shall never close our doors to you, please do not close your hearts and minds to us . . ."
