But the word "arouse", I think, should be a key word in our definition. For it is what a person does that is essentially important. Whatever our definition, we should put it to use to make it worthwhile.

Putting it to use can mean working for legislation that we think will improve the lot of our fellow men; it may mean trying to understand the other fellow or his point of view; or working for a cause for the love of it; it may mean ~~and~~ having the courage to do something worthwhile that we otherwise not have dared, and thus we grow.

It has to do with a certain part of the Student Union lounge, and to the fact that the Jewish students seem to congregate there to the extent that few other students enter that section. The other student social factions gather elsewhere in the building.

The question arises: Is this condition a healthy one? Those who say NO reason that 1 of the advantages of a public institution like UC is the mixing and throwing together of students of various religious and cultural backgrounds, which in turn enriches the experience of all concerned. Such segregation as that mentioned, they point out, greatly nullifies that advantage and makes 1 group feel different from another.

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
