

REMEMBERING RABBI INDICH

Rabbi Indich was a special friend. I am a member of Rockdale Temple. I was president of the Jewish Federation from 1982-1985, for years every past president and every campaign chairman was on the board— over 100 board members. They would all attend one meeting a year— the allocation meeting. They would argue for their organizations over amounts of \$50. Some years, the meetings would end at 1:00 am.

I appointed Rabbi Indich and Rabbi Gottshalk to the board and asked them to help me make changes. We reduced the Board to about 30 and got things done. Thru Rabbi Indich I became friends with Ed Brueggeman (A Jesuit Priest at Xavier University). He came with me to the University's Holocaust Memorial and was a real friend.

I lived on Forest Avenue when I was a little boy next door to Mr. and Mrs. Fisher. One day a new person moved in with them. I think Mr. Fisher told my parents that the new person was 28 years old and was the new Rabbi of the Forest Avenue shul. That was my introduction to Rabbi Indich whom I would then know for many years to come. As he grew in stature, I always remember him as the young guy who moved in next door. My other memory of him was 10 years later. We had moved from Forest Avenue to Golf Manor. I was playing basketball at the Golf Manor playground after school one day. I was filthy dirty when a voice said: "We need a minyan and Rabbi Indich thought you might be here so the game is over, come over to the shul with me right now ." I told Mr. Fisher I was full of dust, dirt, and mud but he said Rabbi Indich didn't care what I looked like - he needed me. So I quit the game and went with Mr. Fisher to the shul to complete the minyan and from that point on I always did whatever Rabbi Indich asked me to do. Such was the stature of that man!
